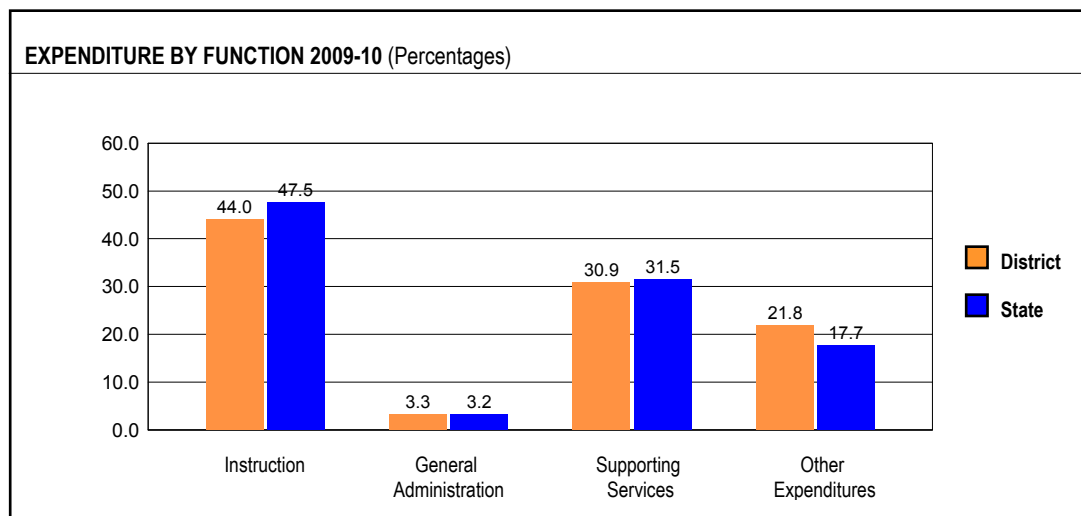

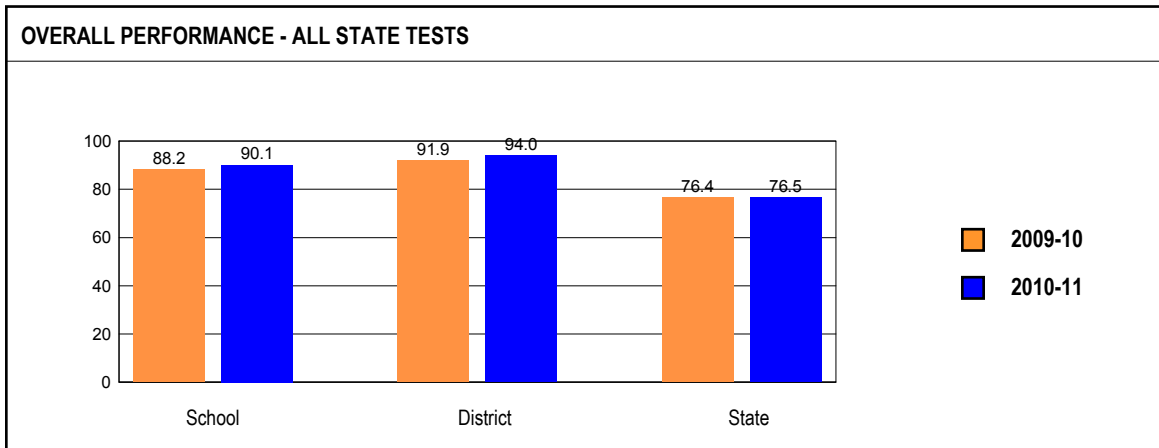

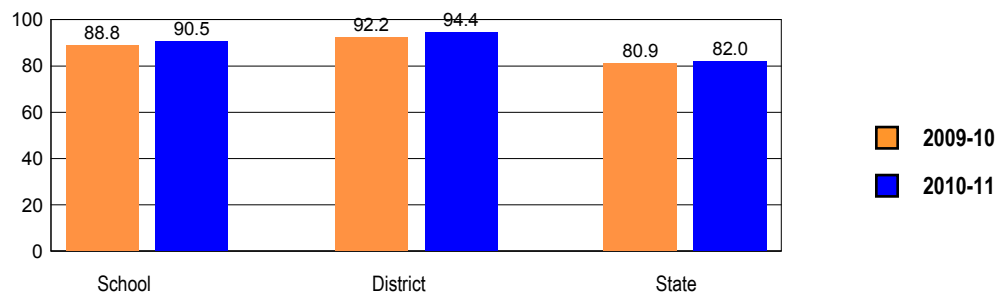

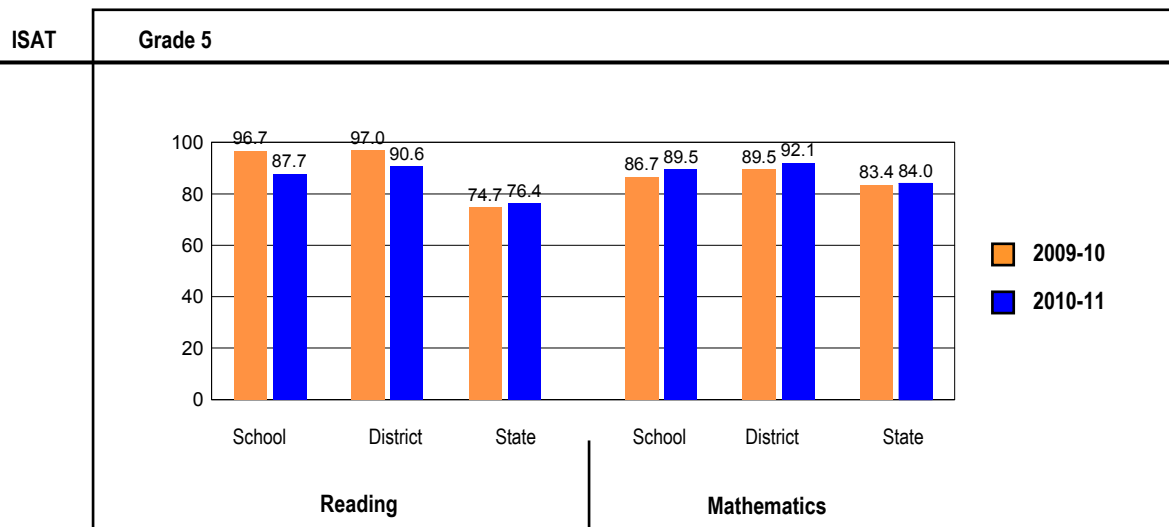
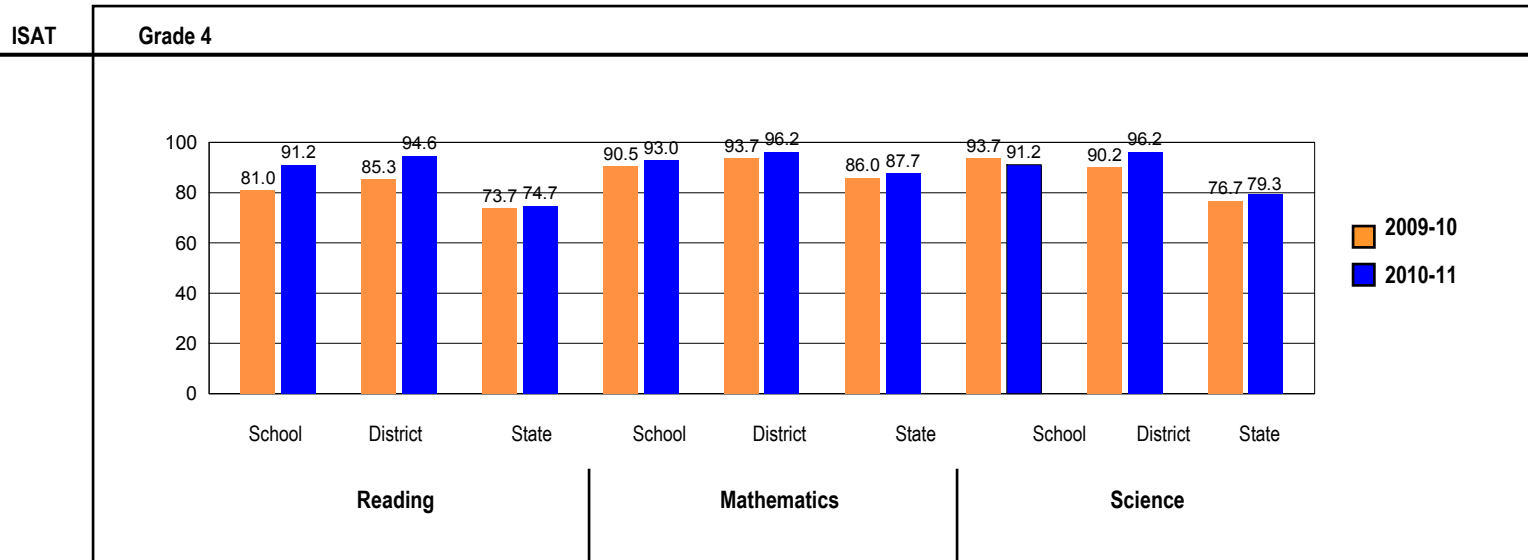
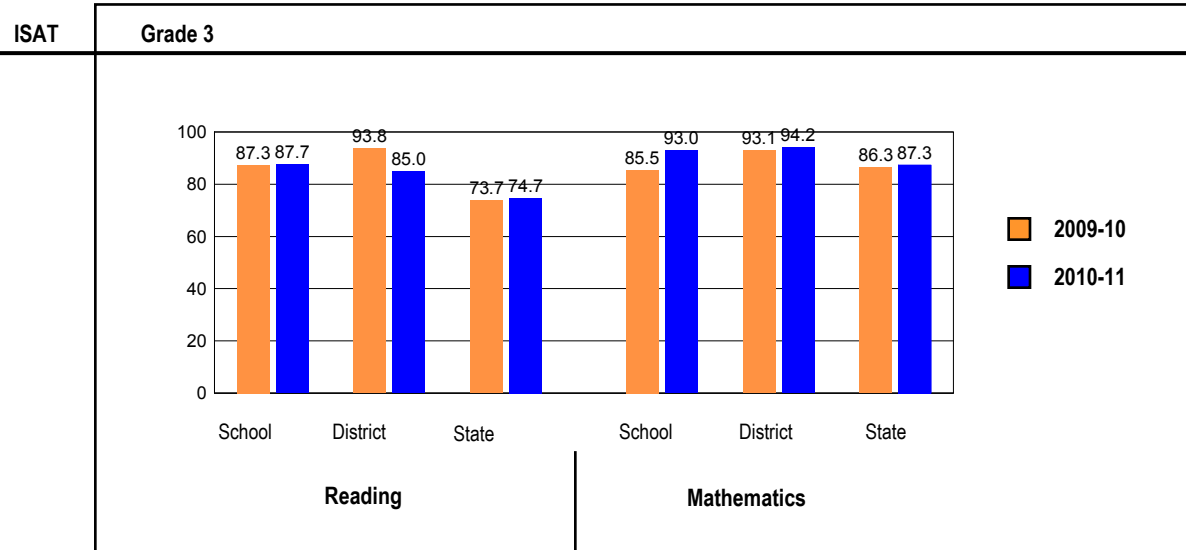


OVERALL ILLINOIS STANDARDS ACHIEVEMENT TEST (ISAT) PERFORMANCE

PERFORMANCE ON STATE ASSESSMENTS

Federal law requires that student achievement results for reading, mathematics, and science for schools providing Title I services be reported to the general public.

The Illinois Standards Achievement Test (ISAT) is administered to students in grades 3 through 8. The Prairie State Achievement Examination (PSAE) is administered to students in grade 11. The Illinois Alternate Assessment (IAA) is administered to students with disabilities whose Individualized Education Programs (IEPs) indicate that participation in the ISAT or PSAE would not be appropriate.

Students with disabilities have an IEP (No Child Left Behind Act). An IEP is a written plan for a child with a disability who is eligible to receive special education services under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act.

Reading and Mathematics are tested in grades 3 through 8 and 11. Science is tested in grades 4, 7, and 11.

In order to protect students' identities, test data for groups of fewer than ten students are not reported.

- Level 1 -- Academic Warning - Student work demonstrates limited knowledge and skills in the subject. Because of major gaps in learning, students apply knowledge and skills ineffectively.
- Level 2 -- Below Standards - Student work demonstrates basic knowledge and skills in the subject. However, because of gaps in learning, students apply knowledge and skills in limited ways.
- Level 3 -- Meets Standards - Student work demonstrates proficient knowledge and skills in the subject. Students effectively apply knowledge and skills to solve problems.
- Level 4 -- Exceeds Standards - Student work demonstrates advanced knowledge and skills in the subject. Students creatively apply knowledge and skills to solve problems and evaluate the results.

If the current year participation rate is less than 95%, this condition may be met if the average of the current and preceding year rates is at least 95%, or if the average of the current and two preceding years is at least 95%. Only actual participation rates are printed. If the participation rate printed is less than 95% and yet this school makes AYP, it means that the 95% condition was met by averaging.
- At least 85% meeting/exceeding standards in reading and mathematics for every group. For any group with less than 85% meeting/exceeding standards, a 95% confidence interval was applied. Subgroups may meet this condition through Safe Harbor provisions. ***
- At least 91% attendance rate for non-high schools and at least 82% graduation rate for high schools.

Targeted Areas for Improvement**1. Learning Area – Math*****Expectations for Student Learning***

- Teachers in grades K-5 will create ***classroom learning goals*** based on the results of the Measures of Academic Progress (MAP) assessment given to the students in August. It is expected that 70% of the students at each grade level (1-5) will meet or exceed their RIT growth target as measured by the spring MAP assessment and reported according to the Student Growth Index in math.

Improvement Goal:

70% of the students at grades 1-5 will meet or exceed their math growth target as measured by the MAP test from September to April (fall to spring).

- **Students in grades K-5 will be given a MAP math goal in one of the following areas: problem solving, number sense, computation, measurement/ geometry, statistics/probability, or algebra.**
- **K-5 teachers will be assisted in their goal writing efforts with support meetings in the month of October.**
- **Goals will be shared with students in October and with parents at parent-teacher conferences in November. Teacher will also share how these goals will be integrated within classroom instruction during math class.**
- **Data will be kept as to how often students are involved in goal work within the classroom.**
- **Progress monitoring using the MAP assessment will take place in January and in April to check the progress of student goals. Student growth will be reported in April according to the Student Growth Index Report available for grades 1-5.**

2. Learning Area – Literacy, Writing***Expectations for Student Learning***

- Students will compose well organized and coherent writing for specific purposes and audiences.

Improvement Goal:

90% of the students in grades 2-5 will meet or exceed ECRA writing assessment expectations which will be measured in March of 2012.

- **All second, third, fourth and fifth grade students will be assessed on an ECRA writing assessment in September. This will create a baseline score for each student. The students will then be assessed again in March to check for progress.**
- **Students in grades K-5 will complete leveled and differentiated writing lessons, which were created by DuJardin teachers.**
- **Staff will be asked to share student writing samples with the administration throughout the course of the school year.**
- **Students will then be reassessed in March. Results from the March will show that 90% of the 2nd-5th grade students will either meet or exceed ECRA standards.**
